

FULTON AND DEKALB DEMOGRAPHICS

- \checkmark Fulton County is the most populated County in the state followed by DeKalb County at the fourth most populated.
- ✓ Both Counties are expected to grow at a rapid pace between 2015 and 2040 (DeKalb 22% and Fulton - 30%).

- \checkmark Both counties show more diversity than is average for the state.
- ✓ DeKalb County houses a greater percentage of Latino, African American, and LES residents.
- \checkmark There are significant differences that (at times) may lead to disparities between the north and the south, by race, gender and age.



• <u>Employment:</u>

 $\sqrt{1}$ 1 in 5 residents are unemployed in 14 zip code areas split equally between the counties.

- Education:
 - ✓ 1 in 5 residents do not have a high school diploma in 10 zip code areas split between the counties.
- <u>Income:</u>
 - \checkmark DeKalb has lower income than Fulton, poverty has increased in both
 - ✓ Child Poverty is prevalent in both counties; however, single parent poverty is more prevalent in Fulton than DeKalb.

WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT DISPARITIES Access to Care:

- ✓ There are significant socioeconomic barriers (CNI 5.0) to accessing healthcare in 6 zip code areas four of which are in Fulton County. Priority ZIP codes: 30340, 30021, 30314, 30310, 30354, 30315
- ✓ Fulton County shows higher rates of adults with no regular doctor, a lower FQHC rate, and a steeper decline in PCP rates when compared to DeKalb.

- ✓ 1 in 4 residents are uninsured in 16 zip codes -11 of which are in Fulton County.
 - DeKalb overall has higher than state uninsured rates while Fulton County shows a greater concentration of uninsured across 7 zip codes than any region in DeKalb (30315, 30310, 30314, 30354, 30311, 30313, 30337).
