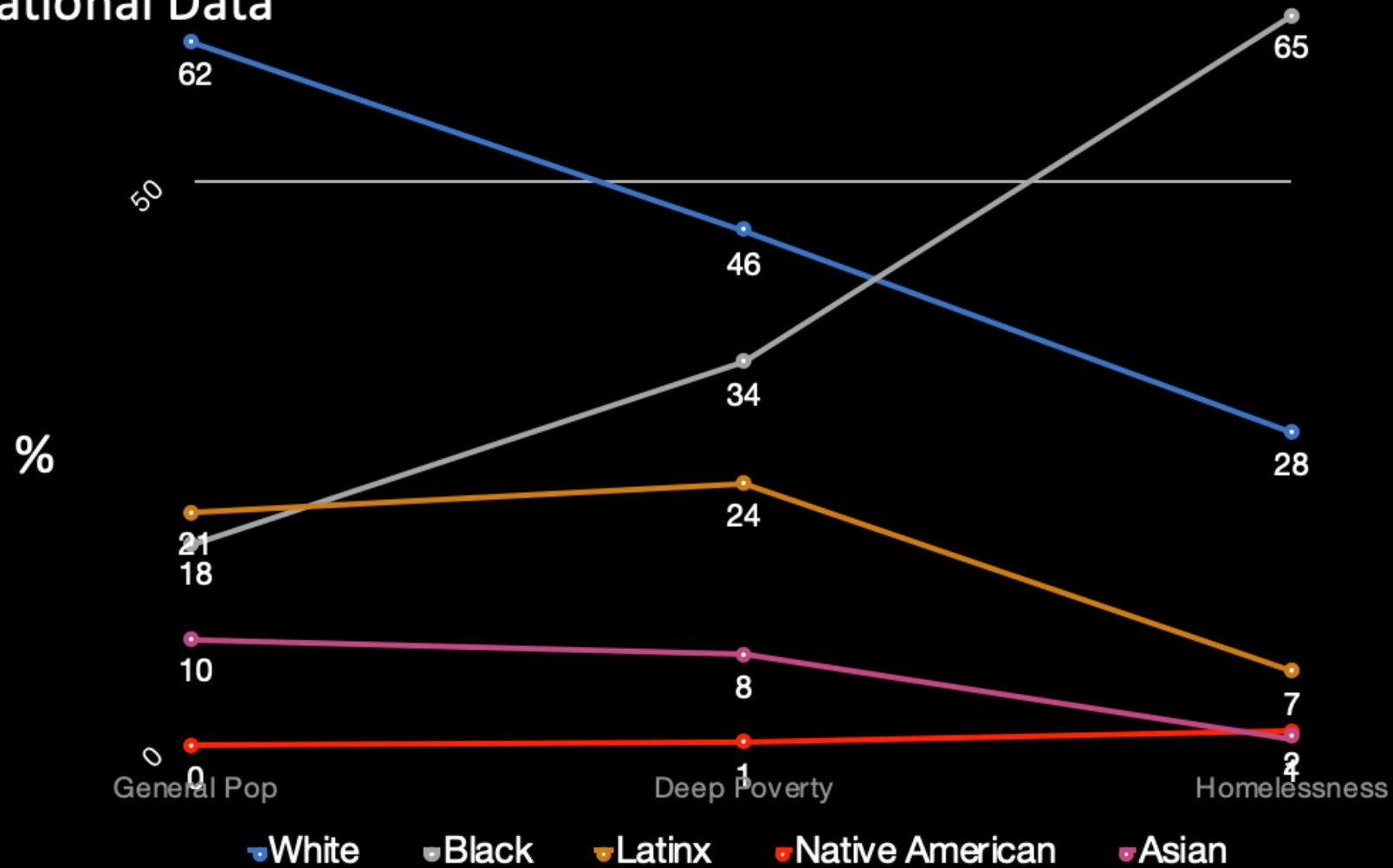

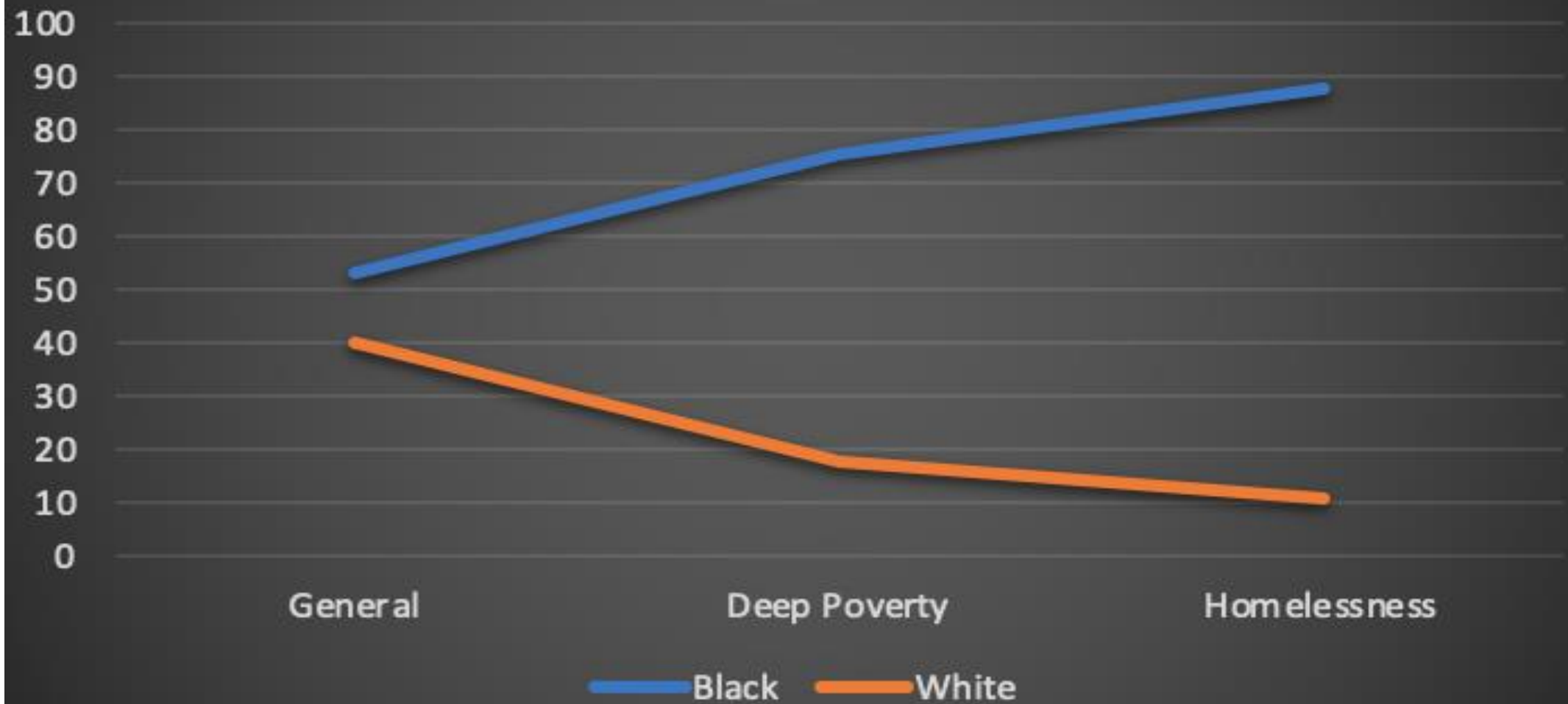

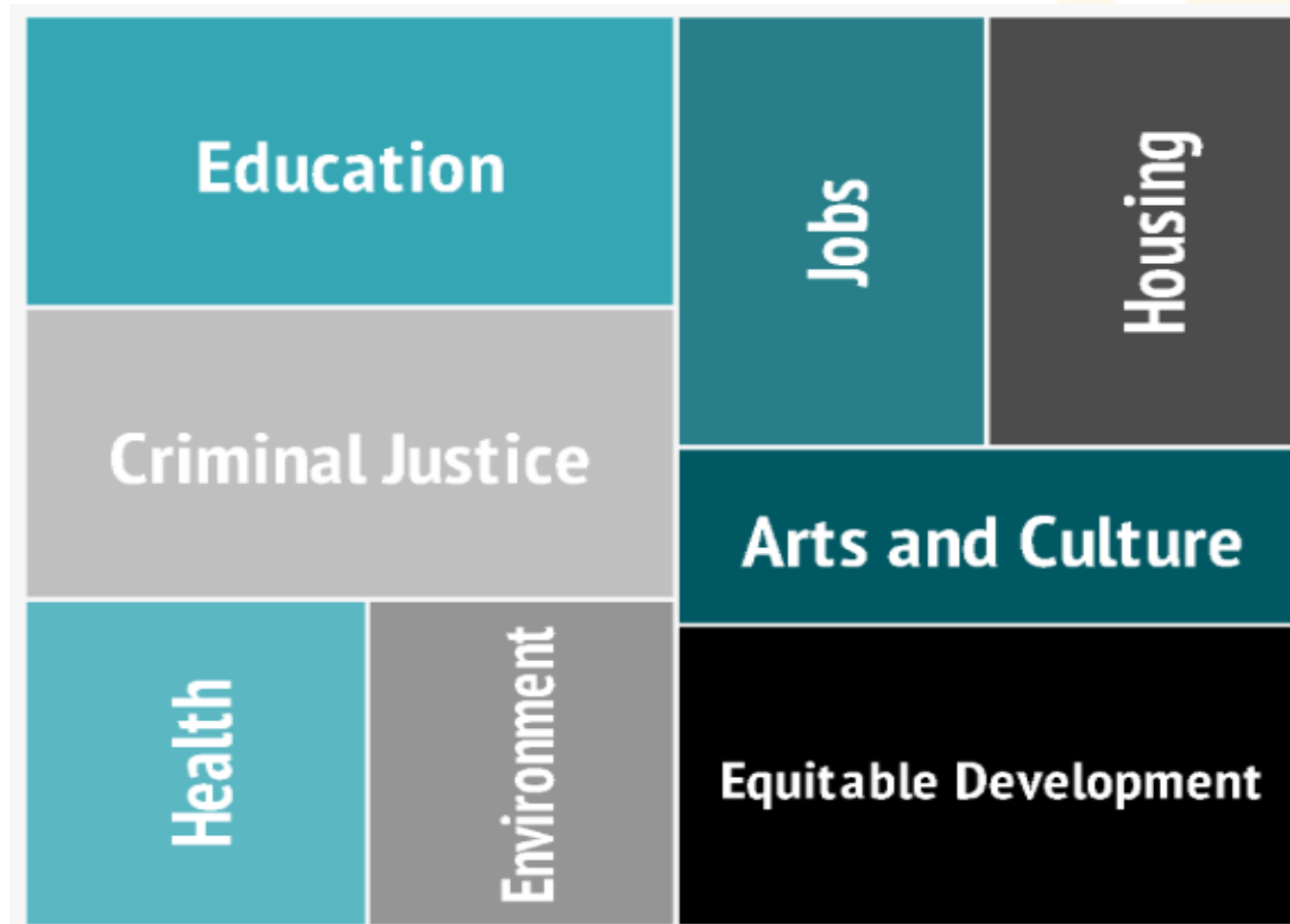

Contributing Systems to Racial Inequities in Homelessness





Pathways into Homelessness

1. Network Impoverishment
2. Threats to Safety
3. Unmet Health Needs



Barriers to Exiting Homelessness

1. Difficulty Navigating the System
2. Employment Accessibility and Economic Mobility
3. Ineffective Behavioral Health Services

Recommendations

Prevention:

- Utilize innovative upstream interventions to prevent homelessness for people of color
- Investigate flexible subsidies to mitigate the effects of network impoverishment

Crisis Response System:

- Design an equitable Coordinated Entry System
- Support anti-racist program delivery
- Promote ongoing anti-racism training for homeless service providers
- Support organizational development to ensure racial equity at the organizational level.

Systems Improvement:

- Incorporate racial equity into grantmaking and contracting for homelessness and housing programs
- Include racial equity into grantmaking and contracting for homelessness and housing programs
- Increase safe, ELI housing options
- Meet the health and needs of communities of color



Atlanta Structural Change Objectives

Improving access to public transportation in the Greater Atlanta area by improving current infrastructure, expanding public transportation routes, and including greater community involvement in planning.

Affirmatively furthering fair housing, with a focus on redesigning the evictions process, including fair representation and adequate support services, and supporting efforts to expand inclusionary zoning.

- Expand and prioritize affordable housing for people of color with 0-30% AMI

- Reduce the number of and impact of evictions among families of color

Improve access to behavioral health services.

- Educate funders and health care systems on how behavioral health issues influence people of color's experience of homelessness and thus increase and improve implementation of culturally competent care.

Increase health care coverage to people of color through an 1115 waiver

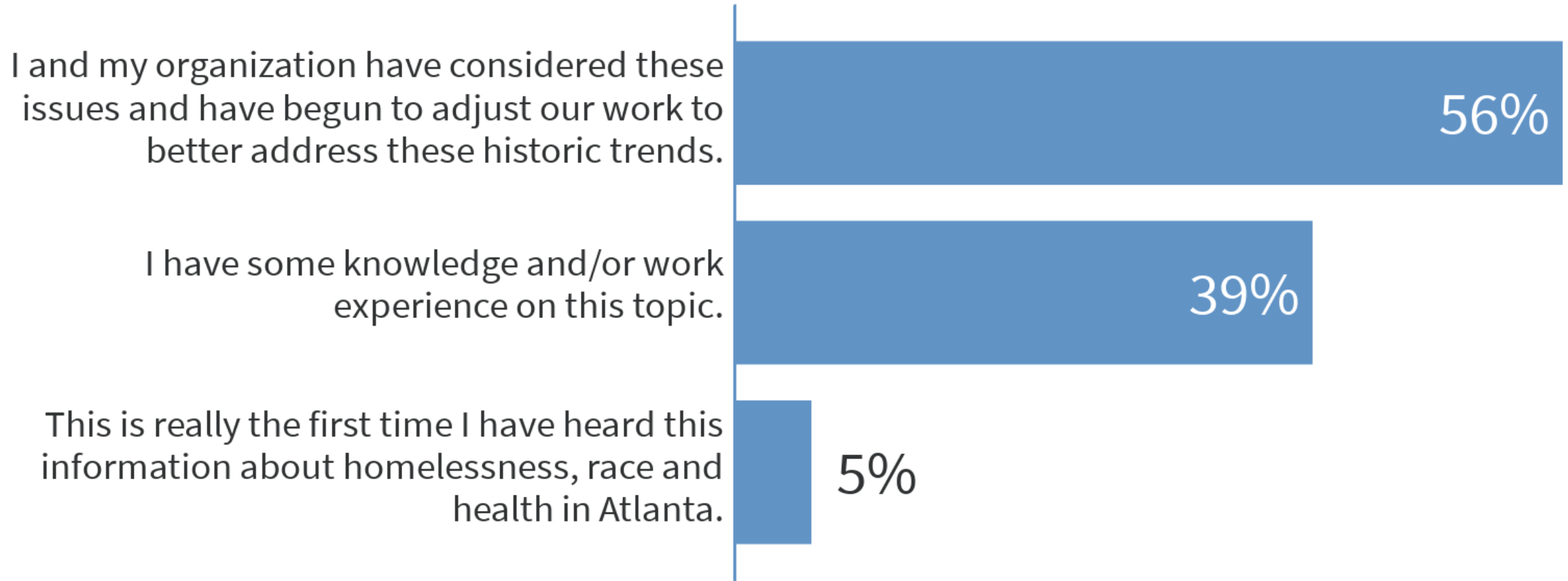

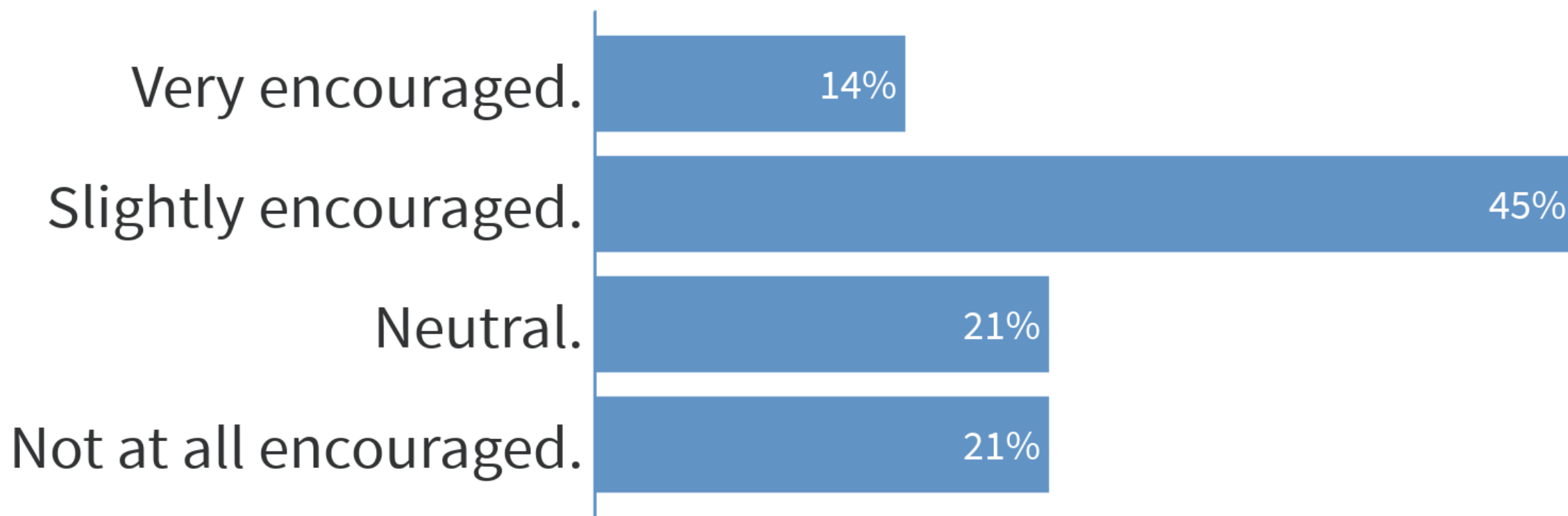
While the pathways to homelessness disproportionately impact Black people and People of Color all over the country, what are some contributing factors that are specific to the Atlanta context?
